#### Attendance

Goodattendance is a priority in our school. If your child is absent from school, please give a letter of explanation to the teacher. Under the Education Welfare Act 2000, parents must let the school know if their child is absent and why. The school has to report the non-attendance of any pupil who misses 20 days or more in any school year, including sickness & hospitalizations, to the Education Welfare Board

### Arriving on the first day


Besure to arrive on time to drop your daughter to her classroom door.

# Lunches

Know how to flush the toilet and wash her hands, without having been told.



- Get your child into the habit of being on time and coming to school every day.
- Children need plenty of rest. Make sure they are in bed early.
- Show an interest in the work your child brings home. Please support your child with any homework she may get.
- Please check your child's folder every day for messages.
- Be patient and give plenty of praise for your child's efforts.
- If your phone number or address changes during the year, please give details to the school secretary and class teacher.

  Correct and updated contact details are very important in case we need to inform you of a medical emergency.







### Getting ready for Learning

Childrenare natural learners. They are curious about everything. They want to know more about everything—about themselves, others, the world around them. They learn fast, but only when they are ready and their interest is aroused.

Children learn in different ways and at different speeds. Our first year in school includes settling in relating to others, making friends, feeling happy and getting used to the routine of school

On the Learning side the emphasis is on getting children ready for learning by -

- Learning through play—is the most enjoyable and effective way.
- Developing their oral language and expression.
- Sharpening their senses, especially seeing, hearing and touching
- Developing physical coordination, including hands and fingers
- Extending their concentration and getting them to listen well.
- Cooperating with teachers and other children.
- Performing tasks by themselves.
- Working with others and sharing with them.









### Language


Children communicate their thoughts, feelings, needs, curiosities and desires through speech.

### You can Help

- Speak with your child at every opportunity: athome, at the shops, on the street, in the park.
- \* Maketimetolisten when they want to telly ou something that is important to them.
- \* Answer questions with patience and in an age appropriate way.
- Recite nursery rhymes and sing songs together. Rhyming is an important step in learning to read.
- \* Give your child lots of time to use her imagination, for example dressing up and pretend play.
- \* Help your child explore feelings and ideas through play.








### Getting ready to read.

- \* Have colourful books in the home.
- \* Teach your child to respect and care for books.
- Read different types of stories: fairy tales, adventure stories, funny stories.
- Look at the pictures with your child. You can tell awonderful story from pictures.
- Pointatthewordsasyoureadthem. Your childwill learn that we read from left to right.
- Teach your child how to turn a page.
- \* Ask predictive questions. What do you think happens next? etc
- \* Takeyour child to the library and read stories to gether. Share a love of books and words with your child. She will have a favourite story and will want you to read it over and over. Gradually ask her to tell you the story.







### Getting Ready for Writing

- \* Making letters on paper is not easy for a small child. They must learn to hold the pencil correctly and make regular shapes. Their finger muscles are only developing at this stage. You can help them to prepare for writing by encouraging the use of:
  - Jigsaws, lego, threading beads etc.
  - Playdoh (Marla) to make their own shapes.
  - A colouring book and thick crayons.
  - Sheetsofpapertocutup with safety scissors.









### **Understanding Maths**


Maths is part of the language children use in understanding and talking about certain things in their daily experience. In Junior Infants the maths programme includes the following:

- Associating certain numbers with particular things—two hands, four wheels, five fingers etc.
- · Counting—one, two, three, four, five.
- Colours—black, white, red, green, blue etc.
- Mathematical Language for example, before/after, above/below, under/over.
- Matching/sorting—objects of the same colour/size/texture/shape.
- Shapes—2D and 3D shapes.
